1d	• can create interdisciplinary learning experiences that allow students to integrate knowledge, skills, and methods of inquiry from several subject areas.

2. Learning and Human Development - The teacher understands how students learn and develop, and can provide learning opportunities that support their intellectual, social, and personal development.

The teacher...		
2a	• understands that students' physical, social, emotional, moral and cognitive development influence learning and knows how to address these factors when making instructional decisions.	
2b	• stimulates student reflection on prior knowledge and links new ideas to already familiar ideas, making connections to students' experiences, providing opportunities for active engagement, manipulation, and testing of ideas and materials, and encouraging students to assume responsibility for shaping their learning tasks.	

COMMENTS:

3. Adapting Instruction to Diversity in Learning - The teacher understands how students differ in their approaches to learning and creates instructional opportunities that are adapted to diverse learners.

The teacher...		
3a	• understands and can identify differences in approaches to learning and performance, including different learning styles, multiple intelligences, and performance modes, and can design instruction that helps use students' strengths as a basis for growth.	
3b	• knows about areas of exceptionality in learning—including learning disabilities, visual and perceptual difficulties, and special physical or mental challenges.	
3d	• seeks to understand students' families, cultures, and communities, and uses this information as a basis for connecting instruction to students' experiences (e.g. drawing explicit connections between subject matter and community matters, making assignments that can be related to students' experiences and cultures).	

COMMENTS:

4. Variety of Instructional Strategies - The teacher understands and uses a variety of instructional strategies to encourage students' development of critical thinking, problem solving and performance skills.

The teacher...		
4a	• knows how to enhance learning through the use of a wide variety of materials as well as human and technological resources (e.g. computers, audio-visual technologies, videotapes and discs, local experts, primary documents and artifacts, texts, reference books, literature, and other print resources).	
4b	• uses multiple teaching and learning strategies to engage students in active learning opportunities that promote the development of critical thinking, problem solving, and performance capabilities that help students assume responsibility for identifying and using learning resources.	

COMMENTS:

5. Motivation and Classroom Management - The teacher uses an understanding of individual and group motivation and behavior to create a learning environment that encourages positive social interaction, active engagement in learning, and self-motivation.

The teacher...		
5a	• understands the principles of effective classroom management and can use a range of strategies to promote positive relationships, cooperation, and purposeful learning in the classroom.	
5b	• creates a smoothly functioning learning community in which students assume responsibility for themselves and one another, participate in decision making, work collaboratively and independently, and engage in purposeful learning activities.	

COMMENTS:

6. Communication - The teacher uses knowledge of effective verbal, nonverbal and media communication techniques to foster active inquiry, collaboration, and supportive interaction in the classroom.

The teacher...		
6a	• knows about and can use effective verbal, nonverbal, and media communication techniques (e.g. appropriate use of eye contact, interpretation of body language and verbal statements, acknowledgment of and responsiveness to different modes of communication and participation, shows enthusiasm, uses engaging manner/voice, is articulate and clear in communicating information to students).	
6c	• knows how to ask questions and stimulate discussion in different ways for particular purposes, for example, probing for learner understanding, helping students articulate their ideas and thinking processes, promoting risk-taking and problem-solving, facilitating factual recall, encouraging convergent and divergent thinking, stimulating curiosity, helping students to question.

7. Instructional Planning - The teacher plans instruction based upon knowledge of subject matter, students, the community, and curriculum goals.

The teacher...		
7a	• understands learning theory, subject matter, curriculum development, & student development & knows how to use this knowledge in planning instruction to meet curriculum goals.	
7b	• creates short-range and long-range plans that are linked to student needs and performance, and adapts the plans to ensure and capitalize on student progress and motivation.	
7c	• selects and creates learning experiences (as an individual and a member of a team) that are appropriate for curriculum goals, relevant to learners, and based upon principles of effective instruction (e.g. that activate students' prior knowledge, anticipate preconceptions, encourage exploration and problem-solving, and build new skills on those previously acquired).	

COMMENTS:

8. Assessment - The teacher understands and uses formal and informal assessment strategies to evaluate and ensure the continuous intellectual, social, and physical development of the learner.

The teacher...		
8a	• understands the characteristics, uses, advantages, and limitations of different types of assessments (e.g. criterion-referenced and norm-referenced instruments, traditional standardized and performance-based tests, observation systems, and assessments of student work) for evaluating how students learn, what they know and are able to do, and what kinds of experiences will support their further growth and development.	
8b	• appropriately uses a variety of <i>formal</i> assessment techniques (e.g. observation, portfolios of student work, teacher-made tests, performance tasks, projects, student self-assessments, peer assessment, and standardized tests) to enhance her or his knowledge of learners, evaluate students' progress and performances, and modify teaching and learning strategies.	
8c	• appropriately uses a variety of <i>informal</i> techniques to enhance his or her knowledge of learners, evaluate students' progress and performance tasks; constantly monitors and adjusts strategies in response to learner feedback including modifying tasks and/or accommodating the individual needs of students.

9. Commitment (Reflection and Responsibility) - The teacher is a reflective practitioner who continually evaluates the effects of his/her choices and actions on others (students, parents and other professionals in the learning community) and who actively seeks out opportunities to grow professionally.

9a	• uses classroom observation, information about students, and research as sources for evaluating the out-comes of teaching and learning and as a basis for experimenting with, reflecting on, and revising practice.	
9b	• is committed to seeking out, developing, and continually refining practices that address the individual needs of students.	

COMMENTS:

10. Relationships and Partnerships - The teacher fosters relationships with school colleagues, parents, and agencies in the larger community to support students' learning and well-being.

The teacher...		
10a	• understands and implements laws related to students' rights and teacher responsibilities (e.g. for equal education, appropriate education for handicapped students, confidentiality, privacy, appropriate treatment of students, reporting in situations related to possible child abuse.)	
10b	• establishes respectful and productive relationships with parents and guardians from diverse home and community situations, and seeks to develop cooperative partnerships in support of student learning and well-being.	
10c	• is willing to work with other professionals to improve the overall learning environment for students.
